

On-site Sewage (Septic) System Background








Functioning on-site sewage systems protect people and the environment. Failed on-site sewage systems are a public health hazard.

People can come into contact with sewage when it:

- surfaces in yards.
- flows into streams, lakes, and beaches.
- flows into stormwater catch basins.
- backs up into houses.
- contaminates drinking water wells.

New OSS technologies provide higher wastewater treatment, which allows for development on harder lots and is more complex to maintain.



State Code Revisions





WA Board of Health

Washington Administrative Code (WAC) 246-272A

• Sets minimum standards

KC Board of Health Title 13, On-site Sewage System Code
Must be updated to reflect WAC changes within 12 months

State Rule Revision Process

2017-2020: Draft revised rules

- Review existing rules
- On-site Rule
 Revision Committee
- Public meetings and feedback

2020-2022: Covid19

2023: Rule preparation

- Preparing rules for State Board of Health
- October: State Board of Health briefing

2024: Rule adoption

- January: Public hearing
- February/ March: Adopt rule

Proposed WAC Changes, part 1

Required property transfer inspections

- Beginning in 2027, all on-site sewage systems (OSS) must be inspected when the property is sold or the deed is transferred
- No expected changes in King County

Minor repairs and repairs

- No permits needed for minor repairs
- Requires repair of unpermitted sewage discharges
- Requires least expensive repair that meets requirements
- No expected changes current policies consistent with these requirements

Remediation

- May develop policy allowing OSS remediation to correct certain problems
- No expected change in King County we have a remediation policy

Proposed WAC Changes, part 2

Increased minimum lot sizes

- For new development, minimum lot sizes have been increased by 500-1,000 square feet, depending on soil type.
- All new lots must have minimum usable land area
- King County must adopt this change
- New Local Management Plan requirements
 - County required to update Local Management Plan
 - Must identify areas where we need to plan for sea level rise and nutrients (phosphorus and nitrogen)
- New requirement for approval procedures for installers, pumpers, maintainers
 - King County will evaluate our approval procedure requirements
